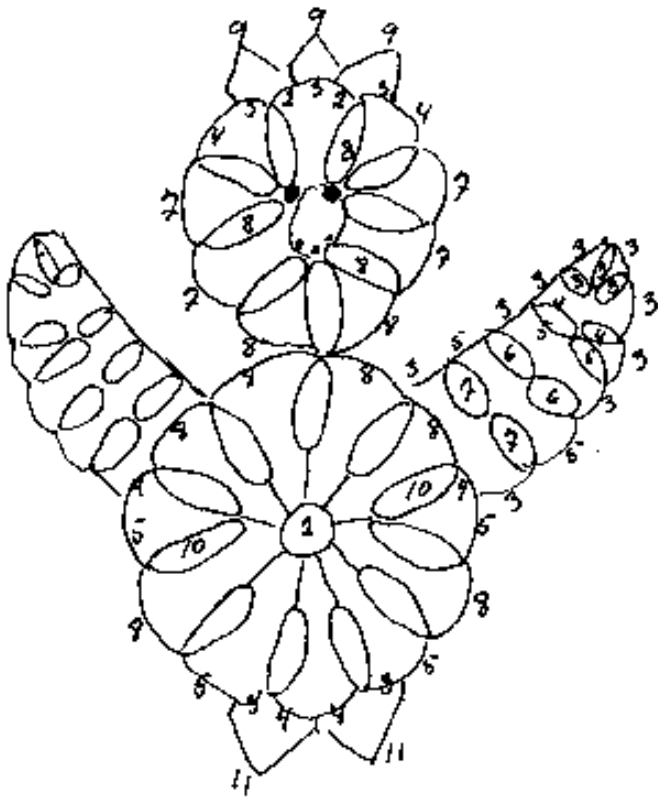


## Happy Chick by Inger Kirstensen
